

Professor Uriel Abulof is an associate professor of political science at Tel Aviv University and studies the politics of fear, happiness, and hope. Introducing "political existentialism," Professor Abulof created the edX course HOPE: What Makes Us Human. He has published over sixty peer-reviewed academic articles and several books and edited volumes, including *The Mortality and Morality of Nations* (Cambridge University Press) and *Living on the Edge: The Existential Uncertainty of Zionism* (Haifa University Press).



Professor Itai Ater is a professor of business economics at the Coller School of Management at Tel Aviv University and a senior fellow at the Israeli Democracy Institute. Professor Ater led the initiative of 380 economists, 60 former senior government officials, and several economics Nobel laureates who signed an open letter expressing their deep concerns about unprecedented damage to the Israeli economy from the proposed legal changes. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees (both cum laude) from the Hebrew University and his Ph.D. studies from Stanford University. In 2017-2018, he was a visiting professor at UC Berkeley, where he taught courses on the Israeli economy. His research focuses on competition and policy issues in the Israeli economy. Before graduate school, Professor Ater worked at the Israeli Antitrust Authority, and he is currently also the editor of the *Economic Quarterly*, a Hebrew peer-reviewed journal dealing with the Israeli economy.



Professor Yishai Blank is the Dean of Tel Aviv University's Buchmann Faculty of Law. His research and teaching areas include Local Government Law, Administrative Law, Global Cities, Urban Legal Policy, Law and Secularism, and Legal Theory. Professor Blank obtained his LL.B. and an additional B.A. in Philosophy (both magna cum laude) from TAU and clerked for the Chief Justice of the Israeli Supreme Court, Aharon Barak, before practicing law in a top law firm in Israel. He continued his studies at Harvard Law School, where he was a Byse Fellowship recipient and where he received his LL.M. in 1999 and his S.J.D. in 2002. He is a three-time recipient of prestigious fellowships from the Israeli Science Foundation and has been a visiting professor at Harvard Law School, Cornell Law School, University of Toronto Law School, Queen's University Law School, Sciences Po Law School (Paris), Brown University, University of Hamburg, and the Oñati International Institute for the Sociology of Law (Spain). Professor Blank's research has been published in top law journals in the United States and Israel, including the Stanford Law Review, the Cornell Law Review, and the Harvard Journal of International Law. Prof. Blank was the Chairperson of the Israeli Association of Public Law, and he is currently a member of its Board.
